
Discourse

This month's academic inquiry is, how can educators incorporate an indigenous perspective?

In "Children, Myth, and Storytelling: An Indigenous Perspective," Gregory A. Cajete explores how storytelling served as a vehicle for preserving tradition and storing information in Indigenous communities. These communities believed it was vital to tell stories to children, ensuring meaningful learning and social development. Children were important recipients of stories because they were considered special and sacred gifts—"bringers of light and good fortune to the community." As we celebrate Indigenous Peoples' Day and look ahead to Indigenous Peoples' Month in November, it seems appropriate to uplift their cultural and traditional values. Indigenous education focuses on four basic disciplines: attention, creative imagination, flexibility, and fluency of thinking. This month's activities will center on these disciplines in our book clubs, which will explore Indigenous perspectives on "ways of being in the world."
